From Father Lameck Summer of God's Love

Our summer season is here. It is a time to experience the goodness of God throughout the entire season. Most of us will be taking some time to relax and enjoy the summer, whilst others will be travelling to different destinations for holiday. As you embrace this season, I want you to consider doing three things in order to be fully present to what God has for you: Pause, Pray and Positioning.

Pause. This means it is time just to take a break. The schedule has been hectic for so long, and you have been doing so many different things. It is time you hit the pause button this summer. Take time to smell the flowers, feel the grass beneath your feet, laugh with friends, and enjoy life. In other words, let us stop, reflect and pay attention to the pause. Psalm 46:10, says: "Be Still and Know that I am God." It is time to wait upon the Lord, refresh our batteries and get us ready for the next season ahead of us. Let us pause.

Pray. The season of summer allows us to take stock of our journey of our spiritual lives through prayer. This is time to have conversation with God and creating meaningful spiritual relationships. More importantly, listen to God. He still speaks in our times of prayer. He still comforts us in our times of need. Therefore, take some time out to have a conversation with God. We however have to be physically ready to catch when something is tossed to us, we must be spiritually prepared to receive what God is throwing our way. Jesus said in Matthew 11:15, "Whoever has ears, let them hear." Everyone has an idea of how they can position themselves as they wait upon the Lord. The scriptures say in Jeremiah 29:11: For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." Then, Proverbs 3:5-6 says: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways submit to him and he will make your paths straight." From The Records

Gwendoline Elizabeth Wingfield 1931-2023



Gwen Wingfield was born on 24th April 1931 in Handbridge to George and Sally Crocombe. She had a very enjoyable childhood playing and working on her grandparent's farm in Pinfold Lane. During the War when playing on the Meadows she looked up and saw a German plane returning from a bombing raid on Liverpool. The pilot had his cockpit window open saw my mother and gave her a big wave. She waved back. This simple gesture shows both the futility of war and the strength of humanity. After the War she joined the Civil Defence force due to the threat of potential nuclear war. It was here she learned to drive in an ambulance. After her death her name was recorded in the Civil Defence Book of Remembrance at the National Memorial Arboretum at Burton-on-Trent. Gwen had a passion for history and would visit all stately homes and historical sites across Cheshire, North Wales and beyond. She was a 'walking encyclopaedia' of local knowledge and history about Chester, and her own wider family connections of 2nd and 3rd cousins. After retirement Gwen and Bob went on many trips and holidays over to the Continent and travelled twice in their 70s and 80s to Singapore and Australia as part of my father's Royal Navy reunions. They also enjoyed Christmas trips down to London to see Ian his family. Gwen's other passion in later life was her garden. Together with Bob she grew roses, chrysanthemums, hydrangeas, gladioli, tomatoes and of course prize-winning fuchsias at many a Chester flower show coming first place year after year. Sadly about 10 years ago she started to develop dementia and reluctantly she had to move to the Oak Grange care home in Mollington.

Gwen led a full life and was a very strong, resilient and formidable woman. A life well lived and cherished. May her soul rest in peace eternally.

Chairman's Report - Councillor lain Keeping

Council elections are due on May 4th this year, but the Parish Council has already been completed. Councillors were elected without contest because there were just 15 candidates for 15 places. This does not in any way diminish the democratic process nor the legitimacy of councillors. Any elector of the Parish (or even another Parish if they work here or live within 3 miles) who doubts this is free to stand at the next election in 4 years hence.

Two councillors, Doug Haynes and Lisa White decided not to stand for election this year and I thank them both for their hard work and dedication over a number of years - in Doug's case a number of decades! Remember that our Parish Councillors are unpaid and represent their electors and not the interests of any political party. Four new councillors have been elected, Peter Clark, Dorothy Darnborough, Mike Foster and Robert Smith, With a total of 15. Tattenhall and District Parish Council has the largest number of seats in Cheshire West (iointly with Rudheath) and since all 15 have been elected we have largest number of councillors (Rudheath fell short of their complement by 7 in their uncontested election).

Only 4 out of more than 70 rural parishes in West Cheshire have contested elections this time and only 18 of the uncontested elections have their full number.

The first meeting of the new council will be on 15th May 2023 at 7:30pm, in the Barbour Institute where electors will be able attend, meet the Councillors and raise questions or issues.

The time burden for Councillors and the Clerk has been managed by reducing the number of Council meetings from twelve to six per year. Nevertheless, the year has been busy for the Council. Routine business has returned to normal following the pandemic, including:

 Scrutiny of and commenting on planning applications (Parish Councils have no power to determine an application).

- Setting the precept (well below inflation this year).
- Risk management and maintenance of Parish-owned land and property ie the Park and children's play area, the Spinney, Barn Field, Glebe Meadow, Youth Pod, Millennium Mile, War Memorial and allotments at Gatesheath.
- Awarding grants £4,690 to 12 local organisations last year.

The Council are aware of issues of particular concern to residents and efforts have been made to address them:

Maintenance: The War Memorial was

closed after sink -holes appeared after the last floods. The monument was also found to be leaning. As previously reported. extensive research and advice was taken leading to underpinning by resin injection. The contractors. Mainmark.



completed the work, at an affordable cost, in time for Remembrance Day. The dogwood surrounding the monument on Mill Field has been removed to prevent damage to the walls and the project will be completed by repointing the stonework in accordance with regulations concerning this grade II listed building.

In addition to the Parish-owned property, the management of the field and pond adjacent to the Spinney has been taken on and together with volunteers from Transition Tattenhall, the maintenance of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee Orchard has been taken over from the Borough Council. Watering of the newly

planted orchard was a particular challenge in the hot, dry summer. The Council has been helped by other volunteers including Sea Cadets in clearance of the Mill Brook in the Spinney and Cheshire West in Glebe Meadow hedge-laying along Chester Road.

Open Spaces: Glebe Meadow is now open to the public, but it is important to preserve this unimproved grassland and wildlife area by keeping to the mown footpath and, if you take a dog with you, keeping it on a short lead and picking up after it. An ecological survey has been carried out in advance of the opening and future surveys will be used to ensure that no damage is being done. The council are currently investigating renovation of the Ha-Ha which forms the boundary between the meadow and Rookery Hall.

The Spinney is now maturing after renovation with a significant increase in wildflowers resulting from increased light levels. Management of trees in the Spinney continues to be an expensive balance between safety and preservation. As with Glebe Meadow, ecological surveys will be continued regularly.

The Neighbourhood Plan review includes a review of the designated Open Green Spaces in the Parish. This has been a significant amount of work for the working group who have identified, defined and justified, 24 spaces and wildlife areas which, if approved, will be protected from future development. The details are available on the Parish Council website in the draft document included in March 2023 Council minutes.

Litter: The Council has supported volunteer litter collection by provision of pickers, bags, collection bins and portable ash trays to encourage safe and clean cigarette end disposal. The Green Dog Walkers scheme has significantly reduced the level of fouling by dogs and free biodegradable bags, supplied by the Council are available from the Post Office and Tattenhall News. A litter-awareness session was arranged for children at the Park School. Following representation by the Council it has been agreed that some litter bins will be replaced. The bins have now been replaced by the Rectory, outside Pluto House, by the Spar

bus stop, Barbour Institute, the brick bus stop and a metal bin with cover by the Youth Shelter.

Road Safety: Following speed surveys, the Council has part-funded the signs for the new reduced limits on some of the roads leading into the village. Sadly, repeat surveys have not shown any reduction in average speeds and in some cases the speeds have increased beyond the limits. For this reason the Council will be pursuing alternative speed control measures with the highways department for the future. The Parish Council has no powers to impose speed controls, but can make requests which has been done with regards to Burwardsley Road and Birds Lane. The Council has also arranged training for volunteers in the use of community speed watch cameras.

The junction of Newton Lane and Tattenhall Road is an increasing concern given the number of accidents witnessed recently. In March, the Council held a site meeting at the junction with representatives of the emergency services and the highways department. The danger of the junction was highlighted by witnessing 2 near-misses during the meeting! The highways department has agreed to renew the signage including white lines, but the police view is that the incidents are the result of bad driving, not the layout of the junction.

Concerns continue about parking and difficulties for pupils crossing the roads at the Park Primary School. This had been the subject of meetings with Cheshire West & Chester officers and school representatives in 2020 and 2021 resulting in adjustment of the parking restrictions on Chester Road. However, the yellow lines are routinely ignored at pick-up time. Representation to the police has been made concerning enforcement of the rules. Agreement has been made to undertake an assessment to see if the school qualifies for a crossing patrol. The assessment has been delayed due to covid regulations.

Affordable Housing: Housing in Tattenhall is amongst the most expensive in West Cheshire. 'Affordable' has a relative definition and so a property at 80% of local average price or rent is still too expensive for most. A housing needs assessment in 2018 identified a significant need for low cost properties for young people as well as for the elderly to down-size. Housing

development in the last 10 years has not met this need. Despite a requirement in the Neighbourhood Plan for 35% of new housing to be affordable, the proportion of affordable in new build in the last 10 years is only 21%. In the past the Council has promoted projects at Smithfield's and Grakle Croft. More recently the Council has supported Tattenhall Community Land Trust in its project to build 4 affordable single bed units on the Keysbrook estate. Hopefully, a strengthened policy in the Neighbourhood Plan review will help, but at present the number and siting of affordable houses built is determined by negotiation between Cheshire West & Chester planners and the developer with the Parish Council excluded.

Other matters: There has been progress in replacing stiles on the most popular publicrights-of-way. Kissing gates have been

purchased and with the support of the Ice Cream Farm routes will be be made safer and more accessible over the coming months.

New lights have been purchased for Christmas decoration of the Village. The Events Working Group has been very busy with Christmas Children's parties, painting and willow-weaving workshops, Platinum Jubilee event on Flacca Field with Sport Tattenhall.

Finally I would like to thank all Councillors for their dedication. In particular I would like to thank Ann Wright for her unerring support without which none of the above would be possible.

Planning

Since May last year the Parish Council has been notified of 39 planning applications, 15 were for some form of extension, 12 were for tree works, and 4 were to vary previously obtained permissions.

We received one application to build a new garage and 2 lawful development applications and 1 relating to converting Medway House into a dental practice. A further application for this has just been received.

We have received 1 application for solar panels, it will be interesting see if the number of applications for solar panels increases in the future as people seek ways to reduce their carbon footprint and power bills.

Other applications of interest include an

application for 27 holiday lodges and 12 holiday pods at Tattenhall



Marina (22/3890/FUL) and an application for a temporary agricultural workers dwelling and new livestock building (23/00876/FUL). At the time of writing these have not been decided by the principle authority, Cheshire West and Chester Council.

The Planning register which includes comments submitted by the Parish Council is published as part of our meetings' agendas, and we post each application when received on our Facebook page.

Neighbourhood Plan Review & Design Code

The Neighbourhood Plan (NP) has been under review since late 2019. The pandemic caused significant delays, but the review is now advancing. Policies have been amended to bring the Plan into general conformity with CW&C Local Plan (LP), a requirement. The main proposed change is to Policy 1, partly to bring it into conformity with the LP and partly to strengthen the requirement for affordable housing. The original NP suggested a minimum of 35% of new housing development should be 'affordable', but the relevant Local Plan Policy is weaker, requiring developers only to "work towards a target of 30%". The reviewed NP draft policy would require "at least 30%" should be 'affordable'. It is thought that this would be in general conformity with the LP especially if there is good evidence to back up the local need for affordable housing. The 2018 Housing Needs Survey provided this evidence, but this is now 5 years old. The Parish Council has agreed to fund an update to the Housing Needs Survey which is being carried out by Cheshire Community Action.

The other main proposed change to the plan is in Policy 6, Local Green Spaces. These areas are defined and justified by the Parish Council and agreed by CW&C after which they become 'designated' and protected from future development. The original plan was deemed not to have sufficiently strong justification for the chosen areas. There are a few additional

spaces bringing the total to 24. Alongside the NP, the Village Design Statement (VDS) was also reviewed. In 2020 the Government published guidance on local design codes and the working group

recommended replacing the VDS with a Design Code. With support from Localities and AICOM. the Design Code is now near completion and will be presented to the Parish Council at the next meeting. The design code is prescriptive for such matters as housing density, materials and environmental protection. There is a requirement in the proposed NP for all planning applications to comply with the Design Code. The proposed change to the NP designated area has been accepted. The new designated area now conforms to the new Parish boundary. Some residences have been removed from and some added to the designated area. Twenty in all are affected and all have been notified. The next step in the review, once the Housing Needs Survey has been completed, is to proceed to statutory consultation before submission to CW&C. The working group does not believe that the proposed modifications change the nature of the plan sufficiently for there to be another referendum, but this decision will be made by the Examiner.

Single Use Plastic

Single use plastic plays a big part in the litter dropped on our streets. Therefore last year we embarked upon a scheme to encourage people in our village to use less single use plastic, if we succeeded we would gain the Bronze level award. In order to do this we needed to supply:

- * The names of three businesses that would reduce their use of single use plastic by three items.
- * Have ten "allies" who would start to reduce their use of single use plastic.
- * Get the Primary School involved and ask the Parish Council to corroborate what had been achieved in the village.

Contact was made with the school and they had a talk from Helen Tandy, who is from a group called Eco Communities, about plastic waste. They were then given the opportunity to make a large plastic monster as a reminder of the talk and promoting putting their litter in a bin! Since this talk litter pickers and bags have been supplied to the school in order that parents can litter pick the village playground area before and after school.

We have been told that we have fulfilled the criteria for the Bronze level for reduction of

single use plastic and once the Parish Council has ratified this hopefully the participating businesses will receive a plaque to show their



commitment to reducing plastic.

In addition we have recently had a recycling talk from Tara Dumas the Strategic waste manager from CWAC which was very informative and she is happy to work with the village on recycling. 90% of plastic is not recycled; it is burnt or dumped. Single use plastic eg plastic bags, packaging, straws and plastic takeaway containers just break down into micro particles which pollute our waterways and injure and kill marine life. We can all do something to help including reusing or reducing items made from plastic. Please help us remove single use plastic from our village.

The Spinney



The Spinney has been a great success. Although some people had doubts about the project it has benefitted so many people and our wildlife. The rooks seem to be as lively and vociferous as ever and yet

otherwise it is a peaceful place where the only sounds are generally from bird song. The wild daffodils around the paths were very cheery in the Winter months and the wood anemones and celandines are a picture at the moment carpeting large swathes of the ground. The increase in wildflowers has been brought about as the light levels have improved following the necessary maintenance and at least 34 varieties of wildflowers were identified last year. Last Summer the Opal Club had a very enjoyable picnic in the Spinney provided by the Parish Council and catered for by Alison's coffee shop. It was greatly appreciated and this is part of their thank you note,

"Thank you for your extremely kind gift of

providing a picnic for us at The Spinney."
"Since...the Covid epidemic we have not had the opportunity to take the members out so it was lovely to be able to just walk them down the path from the Vault at St Albans."

Sandy Bears Nursery make good use of the Spinney and as it is such a safe and central place the children are able to walk there and enjoy and learn to appreciate and care for wildlife and the environment. However it is also important for adults to be able to enjoy the Spinney as,

"Research shows that being surrounded by green spaces reduces anxiety and improves the immune system, and that regular contact with nature and green spaces promotes better mental health. " (King's College London 26 July 2022 Anna Naseem)

It is expected that the wildlife will continue to improve alongside our community and both will benefit from each other.

Queen's Platinum Jubilee

The flags were out and the bunting was up when, on Thursday 2nd June, in glorious weather, the Parish Council's Jubilee Jamboree began the Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations in Tattenhall.

Many hours of preparation and meetings later Parish Councillors and members of the community spent the morning putting up gazebos and directing stall holders to their pitches in time for the event to begin.



People flocked to the Flacca field where there was entertainment for all ages. The band played; there were donkey rides; souvenirs on sale; a Climbing Wall which proved very popular;

Face Painting; Soft Play and even a tug of war. Children could make their own crown and there was a fancy dress competition with the theme being something associated with the Queen's Reign.

The bar was open; there was tea and cake; and local food outlets provided Pizzas to go, Fish and Chips and Ice Cream and the Tattenhall Singers gathered to enthral the crowd with several songs in front of the marquee.

The fun went on all weekend with many events.

In the first meeting of the new council held on 15th May, Jonny Kershaw was appointed chairman alongside Neil Matthews and Robert Smith as vice-chairmen for the forthcoming municipal year.

At July's meeting the new area inspector for Cheshire Constabulary provided an update on the presence of community support officers in Tattenhall while PSCO Hurst remains on leave. He also highlighted the constabulary's online resident's voice survey where respondents can highlight issues of concern without having to dial 101 or 999. The youth shelter will be repainted and also be included in the forthcoming Tattenhall art trail this autumn. A consultation will also take place after the summer asking if residents wish for a new multi-use games area (MUGA) and if so where it should be built in the village along with outdoor gym equipment that could be included. Initial plans to improve pedestrian access across the bottom of Church Bank have been drawn up by CWAC council at an estimated cost of £13,000 depending on the outcome of the application to expand Gifford Lea retirement village. In the meantime it is requested that drivers do not park their vehicles across junctions and



and around the village.

Road markings have been renewed along the top half of the high street and the rose corner end of Rocky Lane at the time of writing and the council has also

requested the same treatment at Newton crossroads where a number of collisions have recently occurred. The council also welcomes quotes by email to repaint historic fingerposts in the village centre where CWAC have conditionally agreed to

dropped kerbs and obstruct pavements in

supply paint.

More kissing gates to improve access for walkers on the network of public footpaths crossing the parish are to be ordered with this round of funding coming from



Community Interest Levy payments the council is in receipt of. Marker posts on the millennium mile will also be renewed with new locally-sourced timber.

Ellen Edwin-Scott will run storytelling and forest craft sessions in the spinney on two dates during the school holidays to be announced. Wildflower meadows in the spinney and on the park will also be reseeded this year and next subject to further discussion. Suggestions are also welcomed for where more trees can be planted in the village as part of the Northern Forest which was inaugurated in 2018

It is hoped that the war memorial will be repointed by stonemasons in time for remembrance weekend in November. The hugely well-received Christmas lights will also be making a comeback this winter. And last but certainly not least our annual parish meeting will take place on the evening of **Wednesday 20**th **September** at the Barbour Institute where the village cup will be awarded. Nominations are most certainly welcome in time to be considered at the next ordinary meeting of the parish council on 4th September.

A major problem has recently come to light at the back of the Church which has been developing over a number of years without anyone knowing. It was noticed recently because some floorboards have become "spongy", soft and unsafe. The pipe draining water from the sink has split and the water from the sink has not been flowing into the outside drain. This means when the sink was used water flowed down the Church wall then under the built in units and the moisture-proof carpet tiles. Consequently the problem was hidden from view and only became apparent when the floor boards would not support body weight. The carpet tiles were removed to reveal extensive damage to the floorboards which have rotted away.

The area has been closed off and made safe.

A claim is being placed on the Insurance Company which will cover part of the cost. Ongoing discussions are being held with the Insurance Company, Insurance Assessors and Technical Assessors. The Church is a Grade ii* listed building and as such the work to be carried out will have to be submitted to the Diocese for approval.

All this means a lot of paperwork and if you feel you can help with the administrative side it would be a great help. Just call me. It would be a one


