FROM THE RECTOR

Heb 4.1-13 "How tired are you?"

We live in a world of unprecedented technological change, that once upon a time promised an end to work as we knew it, or at least a massively reduced working week. But as we all know, the fact that you have a mobile phone does not mean you work more conveniently; it means work interrupts your life more inconveniently, and all those additional missed calls results in monstrous additional funds pouring into the coffers of the mobile company. At root, I think that the weariness that invades our souls and not just our bodies is a function of spiritual anxiety. We are not sure who we are, whether we measure up, whether I am acceptable - to myself, to others, to God. On the one hand, we can start working really hard. Making sure that I am moving up the career ladder, getting promotions quicker than my workmates, ensuring that the pay increases and incentives are good, better, best. If only I can keep feeding my anxiety with these scraps from the corporate table, proving myself to myself, adding award upon award, getting more and more people to acknowledge me; or perhaps scraps from the social table, with an ever increasing social circle, more and more friends and less and less genuine connection with people. If only I can keep feeding the insatiable furnace of my anxiety, then I can keep getting up and making it through the day. But of course, it is exhausting, the exhaustion of the rat on the treadmill, precisely because there is no end, just round and round and round. Where can we get the answer to this puzzle of life? Our God offers is rest, his rest, a deep rest for your soul, the rest that comes from having a great, faithful, merciful high priest, who has passed through the heavens and is there, at the right hand of God. He has secured our place in God's people, so that there is an end to the striving of the soul. All its questions have been answered, all its anxieties have been met, all it's needs have been filled. Death will not triumph over it, since Christ is risen; sin will not pollute it since Christ has sanctified us in his death. There is nothing left to prove precisely

because you have been known at your worst and still loved and cherished by God the son, who shared flesh and blood just like you and gave his life as a sacrifice of atonement for the sins of the people. The Christian at rest acts not out of deficit, but out of fullness, clear as crystal on what is and what is not at stake in their activity. The Christian at rest is able to say no to things, is perfectly comfortable disappointing people who want them to do stuff, and maybe even are seeking to manipulate them into things, because they do not take up responsibilities to prové themselves or to please others, or even to please God, precisely because they know that God is already pleased with them, and so a 'no' is every bit as legitimate as a 'yes'. For the Christian, every day is a Sabbath day, every day is lived in the warmth and peace of knowing that it is well with my soul, and that everything that needs to be done has already been done by Jesus. I conclude by asking you the same question; 'how tired are you and how tired is your soul"? Hear the invitation of God to you, the gracious, peaceful, vibrant invitation of God who offers a genuine Sabbath rest. "Indeed, the word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing until it divides soul from spirit, joints from marrow; it is able to judge the thoughts and intentions of the heart. And before him no creature is hidden, but all are naked and laid bare to the eves of the one to whom we must render an account" (Hebrews 4:2-13) God's word, his promise, is not like a piece of information about an offer that some used car salesman is making to you, something you can take or leave, that you have mastery and control over. No, this promise is this kind of thing that tells you about yourself by how you respond, it gets inside you and forces a decision from you and shows the state of your heart, whether it is hard or soft, cold or warm, indifferent or responsive, faithless or faithful. 
Easter Service


Cheshire Hike 2016

The monthly meeting of Tattenhall Parish Council took place on 4th April in the Barbour Institute. The meeting opened with "Open Forum" as usual when residents can

raise matters of local concern with the Parish Council.

Much of the discussion concerned the traffic issues associated with the success of the enlarged and increasingly popular Ice Cream Farm. Many suggestions were debated such as a need for ever increased parking facilities, improvements to the Newton cross roads, a possible visitor booking facility, and much more. Suggestions made were:

A roundabout on Newton Cross Roads; Cheshire railings at the cross roads to improve visibility when crossing Tattenhall Road; perforated metal sheets to provide additional car parking areas.

Concern was raised regarding the skip and fly tipping on Glebe Meadow. The field had been too wet for a wagon to get on to remove the skip but the area had been cleaned up and further work would be done when the annual Spring Clean takes place at the end of April. Hopefully this will soon be satisfactorily resolved. A meeting would be arranged with Parish Councillors, representatives of TWiG and the Church to discuss Glebe Meadow and the graveyard. The Secretary of State was due to issue his decision on the three planning applications which were at appeal by 7th April. It was likely that no decision would be received but Councillors would meet to discuss the way forward so that the Parish Council had a plan in place whichever way the matter was resolved.

The development of the Care Home and associated problems was discussed and noted. Councillors had consulted the CWaC Planning Officer for advice regarding the latest application for an Energy Store and would submit comments in line with that. The lack of progress on the rebuilding of the Park play area was discussed. A price was still needed for the drainage works before any order could be placed for equipment. The wet weather had made the ground too difficult to work with but it was hoped that the project would be taken forward as soon as possible

Cllr Black reported on the Celebration that was being organised for the Queen's birthday. It will take place between 4 and 7 pm on 12th June on the Park. Further details are available elsewhere in the magazine. The Community Land Trust was taking shape. Cllr Chapman reported that there were now more than 100 members and the expanded Steering Group has met and chosen 5 Directors who will form the Board when a Mutual Benefit Society is formed. On Monday 9th May, the Annual Parish Meeting will be held at 7.00pm in the Barbour Institute. At this meeting, the Chairman and Financial Officer of the Parish Council will present reports on the past year. The Village Cup will be presented at this meeting, which will be followed by the Parish Council AGM at which the officers of the Council will be appointed. A Parish Council meeting will then follow, so put the date in your

She was a keen member of the WI and helped in the start and operation of the Opal Club, which was then Age Concern. She and husband John served as volunteers for ten years.

Mavis learnt the art of machine embroidery, winning prizes at the Annual Show.

She will be greatly missed by all who knew her. The family extend their grateful thanks for all the messages of sympathy and support received. Donations will go to the Alzheimers Society and Prospect House Residents Fund.
