FROM THE RECTOR

*"Therefore, if you are offering your gift at the altar and there remember that your brother has something against you; leave your gift there in front of the altar. First go and be **reconciled** to your brother; then come and offer your gift". (Mathew 5:23-24)*



What is the difference between forgiveness and reconciliation?

Someone has explained it this way:

"Forgiveness means letting go of the past, but reconciliation is about committing to a future. It means returning to some degree of friendliness, and for that to happen, trust has to be re-established."

I would put it this way:

Forgiveness is letting go of the past but reconciliation is about restoring the relationship.

Sometimes it is not possible to restore the relationship we once had. Reconciliation involves trust. Trust may not be present, or it may take a while for it to develop. So, you may forgive someone of a past behaviour, but you may not be ready to reopen your relationship with them. If it is possible, as far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone. Forgiveness means we no longer hold the debt of sin against the one who has sinned against us.

Jesus describes sins against others as debts we owe. "And forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors". (Matthew 6:12) For if you forgive other people when they sin against you, your heavenly Father will also forgive you. (Mathew 6:15) But if you do not forgive others their sins, your Father will not forgive your sins.

Forgiveness involves releasing the debt someone owes for sinning against

you. If we do not do this then God will not forgive us the debt we owe. Forgiveness means we can never bring the issue up again and hold it against the offender.

Even if a person does not ask for forgiveness we should not seek a vindictive or vengeful response to the sin against us. Reconciliation involves restoring the relationship following forgiveness.

In human relationships, reconciliation is usually a process that happens over time.

This process may be conditioned on the attitude and actions of the offender. Understanding the difference between forgiveness and reconciliation can make it easier to be generous with forgiveness when reconciliation is not possible. Our efforts to establish reconciliation with one another will help us to appreciate what God has done for us in restoring our relationship with him.

HOMEWATCH



Dear Residents

Villagers are requested to be vigilant and report to the Police on 101 any activity they feel is suspicious around children's play areas or in general. There have been a couple of incidents. In one, a child reported that he was slowly driven alongside by a white van with two men; rather disturbingly they were described as wearing masks. One man was operating a phone which may or may not have been filming the child. He did exactly the right thing, running in the opposite direction of the vehicle and returning to a nearby friend's house to raise the alarm. This was after another report allegedly of a similar vehicle approaching children in Westminster Road asking if they wanted a lift to school. Make sure your child is aware of what evasive action should be taken in the event of a similar occurrence.

The other incident involved a man, newly arrived in this country, who was filming a group of children playing on the Park. The Police attended and advised him that it was inappropriate behaviour.

There were break-ins to two outbuildings at the end of last month. One at the War Memorial end of the Village involved the theft of a chain saw. The other at the Sportsmans end involving the break-in to a shed and removal of a lawn mower that was subsequently recovered, it was thought due to it being easily identified. All similar items can be easily marked by distinctively painting (fluorescent) your post code on items. It would be discouraging to the thief to steal an item so recognisable which could be linked back to the owner in the event the offender's vehicle was stopped by

the Police.

Police surgeries are an opportunity for residents to meet local officers and report any concerns or issues they might have. Please come along.

Derbyshire. They were passionate about the natural history of Cheshire and, amongst other activities, they helped in the work of Broxton Barn Owl Group, seeing an expansion of the barn owl population locally.

Dot enjoyed not only bird-watching, but developing her gardens at Sandhollow Farm and Falcon House in Burwardsley, where she lived for 16 years, before moving to Harding Avenue in Tattenhall for a further 6 years. She wrote her monthly 'Nature Notes' column in the Sandpaper Magazine from 2002 to 2006, these eventually being published and sold to boost funds for St John's Church.

She moved on to Iddenshall Hall Residential Home in 2014, where she died peacefully, surrounded by her family. Donations received at the funeral service went to causes she had previously supported, the RNIB and the Barn Owl Trust.

The June meeting of the Parish Council was held in the Barbour Institute on 4th June. A number of items were raised during Public Participation including Anti Social Behaviour on Keysbrook, and the out of hours usage of the school field. Residents reported that they had not been visited by police rolling out Operation Shield and the meeting was advised that a drop in session was being considered, to be held in the Barbour Institute.

Matthew Morris of Bolesworth Estate reported his concern at the extent of the conservation area along the Shropshire Union Canal. He would be taking this up with the Borough Council.

Issues of litter and speeding were also raised and the organisers of the Tattenhall Garden trail were praised for a very successful event, raising a good sum for Christian Aid.

Much of the formal agenda was concerned with updating Parish Council policies and procedures.

Planning and Enforcement matters were discussed. A variation to the Planning Application for Phase 3 of Inspired Villages had caused some confusion. The Clerk would talk to the Planning Department asking for clarification and would circulate her findings to Councillors.

Plans for the new Tattenhall Road bus shelter were now with the Conservation officer. The Clerk would seek to expedite matters with him.

A survey of the Parish Council trees had been undertaken and the report was expected soon. Some immediate work would have to be undertaken where this had been identified as urgent.

CWac would review the proposals for parking restrictions on Chester Road and adjustments to the plans would be sent to Councillors.

Implementation of new speed limits was subject to consultation with residents who would be affected by these alterations.

A working group was set up to liaise with the primary school over public access to the community room, and another group would contact CWac with a view to asking the Borough Council to increase the amount of open space available to Tattenhall residents. Draft minutes of the June meeting can be found on the Parish Council website. The next meeting will be on 2nd July at 7.30pm in the Barbour Institute.
