Tattenhall Parish stands to lose many thousands of pounds if the New Homes Bonus is withdrawn by CWaC. This could mean that projects such as the new playground; community buildings; modern and up to date CCTV; the restoration of Glebe Meadow; school parking area; Community Land Trust or Wildlife Conservation cannot go ahead.

The New Homes Bonus is money from Central Government paid to CWaC with the intention that at least some of it is passed to local communities to spend on improved infrastructure and is meant to offset the impact of new development.

CWaC already keeps 80% of this money—now it wants to keep it all!

## Tattenhall Community Land Trust

An Open Day was held on 16th January in the Barbour Institute at which John Heslewood of Cheshire Community Action gave a number of presentations to local residents on the concept of a Community Land Trust (CLT) and what it could achieve in Tattenhall.

The first project is to build some affordable units for single occupancy on the site of the demolished garages on Keysbrook Avenue.

To enable the Steering Group to set up a legal framework, possibly a Community Benefit Society, to take this forward, it is important to be able to demonstrate that there is support from the local community. Residents are being asked to become Life Members of the Association for a fee of just £1.00. There is no legal obligation on joining the Society but membership entitles residents to vote at meetings and to elect the Board of Directors who will run the Society.



## HOMEWATCH



#### Dear Residents

Although generally it has been quiet crime wise, we had a couple of break-ins in early January, one to a sports facility on Field Lane where entry was forced through more than one door causing considerable damage and disruption to the users of the building. It was reported that items taken were bottles of alcohol from the bar area.

Another large facility on the outer area of Tattenhall on Newton Lane was also broken into on the same night and it's believed that these were the same offenders. A man was recorded on CCTV stacking drinks ready for collection but was disturbed and made off. A vehicle recorded on CCTV was described as a dark coloured Transit type vehicle. This was later believed to have been dark blue where a possible registration number and description of the occupants was passed to the Police.

A group of rowdy men were reported on the High Street late one night in mid January. Damage to Property For Sale signs by the Barbour Institute were part of the disruption along with the dislodging of large bins at the Pharmacy. If disturbed at night by this type of behaviour please call 101 to report it. Alternatively phone Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111 in complete confidence. The Police need to know at the time so they can deal with it then, not the day after.

It is likely that at after Christmas you may find yourself with some presents that are replacement high value items, TV and sound equipment etc. You may want to security mark these as a number of items such as high value bikes have been stolen recently. Also you

might want to discard the packaging on new items recently bought in the sales discreetly; cold calling or passing opportunist thieves are made aware of what is available in your home by the new packaging left in view awaiting the waste collection.

The Police always welcome your call on 101 to let them make the decision to attend or not, If you aren't sure you can always call HomeWatch 771641 for advice or phone anonymously to Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111.

More resources means Police back in our areas and better response times. So make that call on 101 when you feel something is suspicious.

## FROM THE RECTOR

#### **NEW COMMITMENTS FOR THE NEW YEAR**

Well, it is that time of the year again when many of us make great promises to ourselves about what we are going to do in the New Year. Experience now tells us that about the third week of January, we usually abandon some of these so called annual resolutions. Let us try to be honest to ourselves now. How many of us kept to the diet last year? How many of us actually kept the commitment of going to the gym the whole year? So I am not the only one, am I? Well this year, I suppose we are still determined to make a difference. I have once again made a couple of New Year resolutions I know many of us love to pick and choose each year. Here they are.

- I have decided to eat less fat foods
- I have decided to eat less and do more exercises
- I have decided to spend very little on clothing
- I have decided to stop smoking completely

Now we might well be able to keep these kind of resolutions but they do not make a great deal of difference to our lives, except perhaps to make us lose one or two stones for the whole year. Phil 3:13-14. That advice from God's Word has stood the test of time. I do not know of any more relevant and practical advice for us at the start of 2016. You should never allow your life to be imprisoned by your past. There are millions of people in this world who are stuck on their past and cannot move an inch. St Paul challenges you and me to forget the past and move on with your lives. 2: COMMIT YOURSELF TO GIVE UP YOUR GRUDGES "Bear with each other and forgive each other whatever grievances you may have against one another. Forgive as the Lord forgave you" Col 3:13. God in these words is challenging you directly and personally to give up your grudges. That is what he means when he says forgive each other whatever grievances you may have against one another. A grudge is a deep ongoing resentment that we cultivate in our hearts against someone else. A grudge is an unforgiving spirit that leads to unforgiving attitudes and unforgiving actions. What you need to know is that grudges are dangerous because they are destructive. Grudges break up families. Grudges ruin friendships. Grudges split churches. Will this New Year be just a calendar changing event for you or are you willing to rise to these challenges from God's word and make these commitments and so make it a life changing event? ## SHROVE TUESDAY PANCAKE RACES

Shrove Tuesday, perhaps better known nowadays as Pancake Day, is the day before Ash Wednesday, the start of Lent.



Lent is the 40 day period leading up to Easter and by tradition was a period of fasting or at least eating plainer food - in many cultures this means no dairy products or eggs. Hence the tradition of eating pancakes began; to use up the rich foods of eggs, milk and sugar.

In some countries this day is known as Mardi Gras and is a Carnival Day. The term Mardi Gras is French for "Fat Tuesday", referring to the practice of the last night of eating richer, fatty foods

The word shrove is a form of the English word shrive, which means to obtain forgiveness for one's sins

Thus Shrove Tuesday gets its name from the custom for Christians to be "shriven" before the start of Lent.

In the last article I indicated there would be news of more exciting fund raising events but we are holding off on anything major for the time being.




